Town meeting called to order at 10:00am, March 2, 2010 at the Plainfield Town Hall as warned. The polls were open from 9:00am to 7:00pm for Australian ballot voting on Article 1, Article 2, and Article 3.

Art. 1: To elect all necessary officers for the ensuing year.

Art. 2: Shall the Town of Plainfield adopt amended Subdivision Regulations as proposed by the Planning Commission and approved by the Selectboard January 25, 2010?

This article was approved. The results were 214 votes yes to 69 votes no.

Art. 3: Shall the Town of Plainfield adopt Inundation Hazard Area Regulations to bring Plainfield into conformance with the Federal Emergency Management Agency minimum standards for flood hazard areas as proposed by the Planning Commission and approved by the Selectboard January 25, 2010?

This article was approved. The results were 257 votes yes to 36 votes no.

Charlie welcomed everyone to Town Meeting and made a few announcements; the Cemetery Report was inadvertently left out of the Town Report. A correction to the website printed on page 4 of the report was made, www.plainfieldvt.us. The Fireman's Club is selling food, the Friends of the Library are selling cookbooks and primroses. PACA is selling pie. Jodi Vilardi made soup using Sue Barasch's recipe and is giving it away. Donations of non perishable food are being collected for the food shelf. It was also noted that the banners on display are a few of what will be hung around town. Charlie read a poem called The Blessing by James Wright.

Janet Ancel our State Representative is here to speak. Janet is concerned about the gap between revenue and projected expenditures. She is concerned that proposed cuts will have severe effects on senior citizens and children and other individuals with needs. Janet spoke about Vermont Yankee and that its license would expire in 2012, stopping its continued operation. Janet supported this. Janet also talked about the budget challenges being faced by schools statewide. The state is also facing challenges with the education fund. Janet also spoke about Health Care Reform and that she is disappointed that things are slowing down in the effort to for significant health care reform.

#### Art. 4 To hear reports of Town Officers and act on same.

<u>Auditors Certificate</u> Motion to accept by John Monahan. Seconded by Peter Youngbaer. The ayes have accepted the report.

<u>Town Clerk's Report</u> Motion to accept by Ben Koenig. Seconded by Greg Light. Ben Koenig wanted to know why he couldn't find a report of the vitals that occurred during the year. Linda Wells answered that because of concerns that the auditors had about identity theft they stopped putting the vitals in the town report. The ayes have accepted the report.

<u>Zoning Administrator Report</u> Motion to accept by Greg Light. Seconded by Bryan Pfeiffer. The ayes have accepted the report.

<u>Town Treasurer's Report</u> Motion to accept by Sandy Ross. Seconded by Kate Harper. The ayes have accepted the report.

<u>Collector of Delinquent Taxes Report</u> Motion to accept by Greg Light. Seconded by John Monahan. Bryan Pfeiffer wants an update. Keith Terry spoke as George Cushing, Collector of Delinquent Taxes was not here. Keith said that previous balances were being brought down, however the recent tax brought new delinquencies in the amount of approximately

\$80,000.00. Donny Osman states that delinquent taxes have been a problem. He wants to know if the town is doing better with the new collector than with the old. Keith says that the opinion of the Selectboard is that the situation is much better. He further stated that past delinquencies were being whittled down and progress is being made. Bryan Pfeiffer wants to know if the \$80,000.00 in new delinquencies are a sign of the economy or the same people that have always been delinquent. Keith answers that there are some new delinquencies and also that some tax payers are on a contract plan to make payments on past due amounts and to pay current amounts when due but have failed to do so. The ayes have accepted the report.

<u>Lister's Report</u> Motion to accept by John Monahan. Seconded by Greg Light. The ayes have accepted the report.

<u>Planning Commission Report</u> Motion to accept by Greg Light. Seconded by Mary Niebling. The ayes have approved the report.

Selectboard's Report Motion to accept by Bob Atchinson. Seconded by Allen Clark. Alice Merrill wants to mention that the town has a new website. Linda Wells confirms that the website is listed on page 4. Diane Tetrault is asking about the Hydro Dam. She wants to know what the status is. Keith Terry answers that because of concerns in the case of a 100 year flood, the project could not go forward as originally designed. The new cost for the new design would have nearly doubled. GMP decided it was not financially feasible. The Selectboard reluctantly gave the grant back so someone else could use it. The time to make a further decision had expired. Claudia Clark spoke about the figures. She said they still view it as a possible asset but need someone to come forward to back the project. The ayes have accepted the report.

- Art. 5 Shall the Town voters authorize an appropriation of \$2,500.00 to the Conservation Fund? Motion to accept by Mary Niebling. Seconded by Brian Hurlbert. Peter Youngbaer wants to know why this budget amount is listed here and in the budget. Linda Wells answers that it is because it is a Town fund. Rose Paul speaks in favor of the fund and that she thinks it is being put to good use. The ayes have approved the motion.
- Art. 6 Shall the Town of Plainfield appropriate the sum of \$8,333 as its share of the first year cost of commuter bus service along Route 2 with service into Montpelier. This appropriation funds a portion of the total cost of the service, which will also be supported by appropriations from other towns, a state grant, and rider fares? Motion to accept by Sandy Ross. Seconded by Andrea Gould. Bob Atchinson spoke in favor of the project, he felt it was very important for people who can't afford to pay for gas, and it is also good for the environment. Keith Terry said that Meredith is here from Green Mountain Transit and the selectboard has some questions. He further states that the Selectboard opposes the pick up point at Goddard. They feel that the pick up should be at the Park and Ride. Meredith is given permission by the voters to speak. She says that the hill in the village is a concern

for the bus. Keith mentions that the buses already use the hill and that the Park and Ride was built for this purpose. Keith also states that the route seems to have changed without the Selectboard knowing, to now be going to ST. J. He wants to know if they will be contributing. Meredith answers that the other towns are in a different region and that they will be responsible for their local match. Keith wants to know what will happen after the 1st year. Meredith says that it is a 3 year grant and they will go from there. Leda Schubert wants to know if any surveys about rider ship were done. Meredith answers that surveys were not done in the individual towns. Lindemann wants to know if there will be additional stops, Diana Tetrault support it, Steve Farnham supports it but worries about parking in the village. Greg Light thinks \$8000 dollars is a lot of money. Nobody uses the park and ride that we built. People are having trouble paying taxes. Kim Pierce thinks it's a good idea. Gary Graves, Selectboard has reservations. The bus will only hold 33 people. Gary thinks the users of the bus should pay and not everyone else, the project keeps changing without the Selectboard being notified. Gary wants the voters to give the Selectboard some leeway in the decision. Donny mentions that the voters don't have to give them money every year. He thinks we should start the service. Debra Stoleroff feels that when the voters make a decision the Selectboard should follow it, she wants to know what Gary means by leeway. Gary is not saying don't do it, but he's concerned about all the changes. Bryan Pfeiffer thinks that Social Concerns committee should address it. Kim Pierce motions to call the question and stop debate. Seconded by Brian Hurlbert. The ayes have approved calling the question by 2/3 vote. The ayes have approved the motion.

Motion to accept by Janice Walrafen. Seconded by Meg Parker. Greg Light wants to know why Marshfield is only paying \$200.00 for the Twinfield mentoring while we pay \$250.00. (There is no one here to answer.) The ayes have approved the motion.

- Art. 8 Shall the Town voters authorize an appropriation of \$25,000.00 to the Cutler Memorial Library to pay for the librarian and the purchase of books and materials to support the mission of the library? Motion to accept by Mary Niebling. Seconded by Melissa Neilson. Alex Thayer spoke about the importance of the local library and in favor of it. Leda Schubert wants to know who uses the local library and also who pays to belong to another library. A show of hands showed that people use the local library and other libraries. The ayes have approved the motion.
- Art. 9 Shall the Town vote to increase the veteran's exemption amount from \$20,000.00 of appraisal value in accordance with 32 VSA Section 3802 (11) to be effective April 1, 2010 tax year? Motion to accept by Gary Graves. Seconded by Bob Atchinson. Diane Tetrault wants to know what about people that are unemployed. shouldn't they get a break too? Gary states that this is only available to disabled veterans. Sandy Ross explains the state pays the difference in the taxes at the \$10,000.00 level, after that the town pays the difference. Meg Parker wants to know how much it will cost the taxpayers. Sandy says that there are only 4 people in the program and it adds about \$1.30 per \$100,000.00 of value per home. Greg Light motions to amend the amount to \$30,000.00. Seconded by Debra Stoleroff. Rose Paul says she would feel better making a decision if she knew what the impact on taxes would be if we went with the \$30,000.00 instead of \$40,000.00. \$40,000.00 would be \$1.30 per thousand and \$30,000.00 would be .65 per thousand. Donny Osman resents that the government puts yet another thing onto the town. Donny is not sure if we should go with \$30,000.00 or \$40,000.00. Bob Barasch feels that the government is already helping disabled vets. Steve Pappas wants to know who put it on the warning. Keith answers that it was a veteran's group that lobbied all the towns. He further answered that

the Selectboard does have the right to put and article on the warning without a petition. Jeremy Matt motions to call the question and stop debate. Seconded by Debra Stoleroff. The aves have approved calling the question by 2/3 vote. The voters will now vote on the motion to amend to \$30,000.00. The nays have defeated the motion. Mary Niebling wants to know how disabled does a veteran need to be. Sandy Ross answers that the Veteran's Administration makes the decision. Steve Pappas wants to know what will happen if we vote it down. Linda Wells answers that it will stay at the current amount of \$20,000.00. Sarah Albert wants to know why the Selectboard would put this on the warning when they don't even put the Conservation Commission request on without a petition. Keith Terry stated that the veteran's request had been done this way before and they are sorry if they have erred. Greg Light motions to call the question and stop debate. Seconded by Jeremy Matt. The aves have approved calling the question by 2/3 vote. The voters will now vote on the original motion. The navs have defeated the motion.

Art. 10 To see what amount of money the Town will vote to pay for highways, bridges, fire department, and administrative operations of the Town of Plainfield for the period of July 1, 2010 to June 30, 2011. Keith Terry motions to approve \$855,608.44. Seconded by Gary Graves. Keith speaks for the Selectboard. He wished that the budget could have been level funded, however it was only increased 4.5% over last year. He notes that there are 5 things that have not appeared before; an audit, Agency of Transportation enhancement grant match, a new heater for the town garage, which is required by law. Also, the first payment for the grader that was voted to be purchased last year and a culvert project. He would like to note that the employees were not given a cost of living increase. Steve Farnham wants to know what kind of furnace will be at the town garage. Keith answers that the new furnace will be a combination of wood and something else. Karl Bissex introduced himself, he is helping the town organize this project. Jesse Shapiro, a neighbor of the town garage is concerned about what comes out of the chimney. Karl answers that it should be improved. The ayes have approved the motion.

Linda Wells and Keith Terry would like to speak. They would like to recognize Claudia Clark who has served for 3 years as Selctboard and will not be continuing on for another term. Keith spoke highly of Claudia and said that she gives 150% of herself. He went on to say that she has agreed to still help write grants. Linda presented Claudia with a certificate. Judy Cyprian was also recognized for serving 6 years on the school board.

- Art. 11 Shall the Town vote to accept the provisions of public statutes relating to the collection of taxes by the Town Treasurer, (VSA 32 Section 4791) and vote to collect municipal taxes thirty days from mailing and not prior to August 1, 2010 and collect school taxes on November 10, 2010 and February 9, 2011, collecting half of the total school taxes on each of those dates?

  Motion to accept by Greg Light. Seconded by Gary Graves. The ayes have approved the motion.
- Art. 12 To transact any other business that may properly come before the meeting.

Glenda Bissex wants to thank all the volunteers for all the work they do. Steve Farnham wants to know why the library cannot be included in the final budget figure in the town report. George Springston asks if there is a statutory requirement that says we can't include everything in the budget figure. Keith Terry answers that our town auditor's recommend that we do it this way. Bob Atchinson invites everyone to get an energy audit of their home. Mary Niebling would like to invite everyone to buy some pie from PACA. Claudia Clark invites everyone to take part in the Plainfield Community Conversations on March 12th and 13th. Allen Clark reminds everyone about the annual shrub and tree sale. Christine Farren spoke about the banners hanging below the stage. They will be hung up as part of a traffic claming effort.

Motion to adjourn at 12:20 by Bob Barasch. Seconded by David Diamantis. The ayes have approved the motion and the meeting is adjourned.

#### TOWN CLERK'S REPORT 2010

Town meeting is on March 1, 2011. Don't forget to bring your town report! The voting polls will be open from 9:00am until 7:00pm. Town meeting begins at 10:00am. The voter registration deadline is February 23, 2011 so if you are not registered to vote, call us or stop by and we can get you registered. If you are unable to vote personally at the voting polls, absentee ballots are available, just call the town clerks office to request ballots to be mailed to you. Vote Your Voice!!

The town clerk's office continues to be a busy place. There were 35 transfers of property processed from April 2009 through March 2010. We processed 11 birth records, 11 marriages, and 6 death records during the year.

We now offer Rechargeable Battery Recycling here at the town clerk's office through the Call2Recycle program. You can recycle your rechargeable batteries weighing less than 11lbs each, and cell phones (with or without their batteries). We do not accept alkaline, lithium primary, or non-rechargeable or wet cell batteries.

The education funding system approved by the Vermont legislature continues to be challenging and time consuming for this office. The state sends education tax rebate money directly to the schools and this is reflected on your tax bill. Late filing of your income taxes creates multiple billings to be processed by this office. If you receive an amended tax bill and your taxes are paid by your escrow company, please notify your escrow of any corrected paperwork you may receive from this office so the correct amount is paid and paid timely. We do NOT notify your escrow company.

There were 259 dogs registered in 2010. Registering your dog is a VERMONT STATE LAW. For everyone's protection, including your dog, stop in and register your dog before APRIL 1ST, 2011. If you are unable to come in to the town clerks office, we can process your dog license by mail, just give us a call and we can assist you. Effective April 1, 2009 the license fee for the VT Spay/Neuter program increased to \$3.00. The fee to register your spayed or neutered dog is \$8.00, and for unsprayed or not neutered the fee is \$12.00. If you forget to register your dog by April 1st, you must still register your dog! After April 1st, you must pay an additional 50% fee; you can bring your dog along too, we have biscuits!! There will be a **RABIES CLINIC** held on March 26, 2011 from 12:30-2:00pm at the Marshfield town garage.

We still process DMV motor vehicle renewals for your convenience. The renewal fee is \$3.00 per renewal. This year we processed 82 renewals. Registration renewals can now be done 24 hours a day. You can go online to http://www.vermont.gov/expressrenewal or by phone at 866-259-5368. DMV also has a second Mobile Van unit that travels around the state for your convenience. The schedule can be checked online at http://www.aot. state.vt.us/dmv

In 2000, an anonymous contribution was made for a Fuel Assistance Fund. These funds are available to community members as supplemental funding and secondary to other local assistance programs. To find out more information or apply for funds call the town clerks office.

A food drive to benefit the Onion River Foodshelf will be done again this year. We have a box at the clerk's office for you to drop off non-perishable items before town meeting or bring a non-perishable item when you come to town meeting. Be sure to thank Laura Ziesel for her work to make this possible.

I want to give a Big Thank You! to Laura Ziegler who has been volunteering to plant flowers in front of the municipal building. She and her helper continue to keep them healthy and blossoming! We appreciate all the work they do!

I want to thank Carol for all she does, and all the volunteers that help out throughout the year to keep this community together! #### LISTERS REPORT

The Listers have been around town this fall doing inspections of completed projects. We will be out again in the spring to follow up on any that were not previously completed and any new changes to properties. We become aware of most of these changes through zoning and building permit applications. We also drive around and make a visual scan of the town to see if there is anything we have missed.

We would like to remind you that, by law, any complaints or requests for us to look at your property must be received by us well before tax bills go out. If you would like us to take a look at your assessment, please contact us by April. That will insure that you have put in a timely request that we can respond to for the coming tax year. Any calls we get later must go into the following year.

All records regarding property value are public information. If you have questions about how we arrived at the value for your property, we would be glad to go over it with you.

Some of you have received more than one property tax bill. This has mostly been due to late filing of homestead declarations. Please be sure to file your HS-122 homestead declaration with your VT income taxes. If you must get an extension to file your income taxes late, **you must still file your homestead declaration by April 15th**. You can go online to vt.gov and file just that form right on the website. It is really simple. All you need is your last year's property tax bill. You will need your social security number, span number and the housesite information that is found in the box on the upper right hand side of the tax bill. Filing the homestead declaration on time will insure that you will not be charged the higher non-residential school tax rate or a late filing penalty.

If you are unsure about how to file the homestead declaration or would like help filing online, please contact us. We would be glad to help you. It only takes a couple of minutes.

# REPORT FROM THE PLAINFIELD PLANNING COMMISSION 2010

The Plainfield Planning Commission's roles and responsibilities were changed considerably in 2010. In the past, the planning commission's responsibilities were two-fold. One was legislative with the responsibility of researching, drafting and proposing the town plan and the zoning, the subdivision, and the inundation (flooding) regulations. The other was quasi-judicial in which the commission held hearings and made decisions on a variety of zoning applications including boundary line adjustments, subdivision site plan reviews and right-of way proposals.

In December of 2009, the Plainfield Select Board voted to change the current town model from a Planning Commission and a Zoning Board of Adjustments to a Planning Commission and a Development Review Board. This resulted in planning commission continuing to perform its legislative responsibilities and the Development Review Board assumed the quasi-judicial duties.

The newly formed Planning Commission first met on April 6, 2010. The appointed members were Will Colgan, Matt Cota, David Smith, Angela Magara and myself, Karen Storey. Will, David and I had been serving on the past planning commission. Matt and Angela were new to the area and graciously accepted the challenge. Unfortunately, Angela was unable to continue as her work schedule increased. Long time Plainfield resident, Cito Hardy was appointed as her replacement.

The commission's current primary responsibility is to work on updating the 2007 Town Plan. A town plan is a visionary document that assesses the current status of the community and lays out a vision for the future. We are very fortunate and grateful to have a wealth of information available through the continued support and participation of community members in answering the 2009/2010 Survey titled "Plainfield 2012/2014 and Beyond-What's in our future?" and in attending Plainfield Community Conversation held on March 12 and 13, 2010. The community participants' thoughts, consideration, ideas, concerns, suggestions and recommendations have been recorded and tallied. A Vision Statement for Plainfield was generated from the public participation in the Conversation is planned to be a corner stone of the future update.

Other reports available to review and study: 2006 amended Vermont Municipal and Regional Planning Act Title 24 VSA Chapter 117, 2007 Plainfield Build Out Study by The Regional Planning Commission, 2007 Creative Community Project sponsored by The Vermont Council on Rural Development, 2009 Commission on the Future Economic Development generated by the Snelling Center, 2009"Imagining Vermont" study sponsored by The Vermont Council on Rural Vermont.

Community members are the Planning Commission's greatest resource. Over the next several months, we plan on contacting a variety of groups and individuals to provide historical and factual information to be compiled for the various of section in the plan. If you are interested participating please contact the Planning Commission at plainfieldplco@gmail.com.

The Commission has also applied for a municipal planning grant to hire an individual to write a comprehensive plan using the plethora of information available. It is anticipated that a final draft will be available for hearing in late summer of 2011, after the release of 2010 census data.

Future work of the commission will be the rewriting of the Plainfield Zoning and Subdivision Regulations following the adoption of the Town Plan. Other work will include exploring non-regulator programs.

The Plainfield Planning Commission would like to thank the many community members for their participation in the past the Survey's and the Community Conversation. We look forward to working with our neighbors as we move forward in the drafting of the plan.

#### SELECTBOARD REPORT

One of the challenges in writing the annual Selectboard report is that in order to meet deadlines the report must be written in late November nearly three months before most Plainfield residents will have the opportunity to read it. That time frame means that some of what is written will be old news by Town Meeting Day. We are aware that this affects not only our report but many of the department and commission reports.

Many positive things have taken place since our last report and some of these are still, as we write ongoing activities.

One very satisfying development occurred when the town ended the 2009-2010 fiscal year with a healthy balance. Using a portion, \$60,000.00, of that surplus the Selectboard was able to keep the 2010-2011 town tax rate the same as the previous year even though the budget approved by the voters increased.

At the 2010 Town Meeting the voters appropriated funds to be used by the GMTA in establishing a Route 2 commuter bus service. Elsewhere in this book you can read the report from GMTA about the success of this commuter service. Also in conjunction with this commuter service Plainfield received a gift of a Commuter Shelter which has been installed at the Park & Ride. Bob Atchinson and Karl Bissex were joined by other volunteers in this project. Also, members of the Conservation Commission put plantings around the shelter and elsewhere around the park & ride.

The work to install an alternative heating system for the Highway garage is underway. A new propane gas heating unit has been installed and work progresses on the connections to make it operable. The Selectboard recently approved a bid for insulation work to be done on the building. Grant funds and an appropriation in the budget adopted in March 2010 is paying for this work. Karl Bissex is overseeing this project for the town.

Delinquent taxes have been identified in our last two reports as a challenge. We are thankful that progress has been made in this area. While it is impossible to know how School Tax collections will play out after the February tax date many of the chronic delinquencies of the past have either been cleared up or are now subject to a regular payment schedule which will enable the property owner to become current.

The Selectboard, after careful consideration and after listening to residents at a public hearing, took action to change from a Planning Commission/Board of Adjustment to a Planning Commission/Development Review Board. The State Legislature, in 2006, adopted and enabling statute and recommended such a change. In addition to the action making this change the Selectboard also reconfigured the Planning Commission. At the present time Plainfield has a five member Planning Commission and a five member Development Review Board. This change has proven to be advantageous since the Planning Commission can now focus its efforts on the Town Plan and Zoning Regulations with the DRB handling hearings, etc. And we would add the DRB has had a very busy summer.

Since no persons filed for election as town auditors Mary Etta Chase again agreed to serve on a temporary basis until an auditor could be appointed. We are happy to report that Terry Call has been appointed to fill one of the auditor vacancies.

Representatives of the Central Vermont Solid Waste Management District are scheduled, during the December 13th Selectboard Meeting, to present a plaque to Janice Walrafen honoring her for her long service to the District as Plainfield representative and chair of the board of directors. We join them in saying thank you to Janice for her dedicated service.

One would like to say that everything that has happened this year was and is positive. However, life does not work that way. Challenges still face us.

Continued negative activities and vandalism at the Recreation Field prompted the Selectboard to draft an ordinance relating to the use of the field and adjacent town property. This proposed ordinance was the subject of a public hearing and following the hearing was adopted by the Selectboard.

We have also continued to have a problem with the removal of and damage to highway signs. While the removal of street name signs may only be an inconvenience the removal of stop signs creates a potentially dangerous situation. Also, the cost of the signs and the labor involved in installation is affecting every taxpayer. Anyone who may have information about this problem is urged to call George Cushing, the Town Constable.

We faced a real challenge this year relating to the health insurance provided to our employees. Plainfield is a part of the VLCT Health Trust and the rates for the Trust increased an average of 17.5%. While a small portion of this increase was due to changes mandated by the Federal Health Care legislation the bulk of the increase resulted from large claims paid by the Health Trust insurer. After meeting with our employees and considering options the Selectboard decided to change to a High Deductible Plan. While some employees will see a short term increase in their costs for most the long term seems to provide individual savings. The town will experience about a 10% reduction in premiums rather than a 17.5% increase.

As this report is being written the Planning Commission has scheduled a public hearing on a proposal to submit to the voters, at the March 2011 Town Meeting, to make the present interim zoning regulations, with minor editorial corrections, permanent until the Commission has an opportunity to rewrite the zoning regulations. Without this action the interim regulation will expire in April. The Planning Commission is presently working on a rewrite of the town plan after which revised zoning regulations will be proposed.

The Town of Plainfield is fortunate to have a super group of dedicated employees and volunteers. We acknowledge with gratitude the contribution of these folks who make Plainfield a great town in which to reside.

As all who deal with the public soon learn, public service can be, at times, challenging and frustrating but also satisfying and rewarding. We thank you for the privilege of serving you

# SOCIAL CONCERNS COMMITTEE REPORT TO PLAINFIELD SELECTBOARD

This year the social concerns committee consisted of Mary Lane and Mary Etta Chase.

#### History

Each year the Town of Plainfield receives requests for funds from many different non-profit organizations. These requests are voted on at town meeting. Four years ago the town decided to streamline this process in order to save time during town meeting. This committee's charge is to review requests sent to the town for funding and to make recommendations concerning these requests.

#### The Process

Our committee met and reviewed the 18 applications for funding from the Town of Plainfield. Due to the financial situation that currently effects the taxpayers we have attempted to keep the amount awarded to these agencies, approximately the same as last year's allocation. We did give more to those agencies that provided emergency food, shelter, medical treatment, and transportation.

The amount is more than last year, because we had one more agency apply to the town, than the previous year. We gave each agency the opportunity to come to the committee and provide more information to obtain more than what we suggested the town provide. One agency, The Family Center of Washington County, took this opportunity and was given \$100 more than originally suggested. We would ask the town to realize this process and not take up the time at the town meeting to provide more money to these agencies.

The breakdown by organization is set out below, with the funding received in '09, and '10, followed by this years requested amount and the recommended amount. The program descriptions either are direct quotes from applications or are paraphrased.

**Battered Women's Services (BWSS)** – \$525, \$525 (requested \$525, recommend \$525 level funding)

BWSS is a small, community-based organization dedicated to ending all forms of domestic violence. It has always provided these services at no cost. It serves all of Central Vermont and is the only shelter in this area available to women and children fleeing domestic violence. It served 14 unduplicated residents of Plainfield this year. Central Vermont Community Action Council - \$500, \$500 (requested \$500, recommend \$500 level funding)

CVCAC helps people achieve economic sufficiency with dignity and supports individual and family development. Its goals are to alleviate the effects of poverty, and to advocate for long term system change for economic justice. In Plainfield, it served 221 individuals in 111 households.

Central Vermont Council on Aging (CVCA) – \$1750, \$1750 (requested \$1750, recommend level funding \$1750)

CVCA uses case managers to work with elders in their homes to assess their needs and develop individualized care plans. Case Management Department staff also provided information, assistance, and referrals regarding health care and insurance, transportation, nutrition, housing, fuel and other issues of concern. Its service area covers Washington, Lamoille, and Orange Counties. It served 98 Plainfield residents.

Central Vermont Home Health and Hospice (CVHH&H) – \$2500, \$2500 (requested \$2500, recommend level funding \$2500)

CVHH&H is a full service not-for-profit Visiting Nurse Association, committed to providing comprehensive, high quality home health and hospice care to all Central Vermonters regardless of their ability to pay, geographic remoteness or complexity of their health care needs. In addition, the agency promotes the general welfare of the citizens of central Vermont with health promotion and long term care services. It serves 20 towns in Washington County and the 3 northernmost towns of Orange County. It served 78 Plainfield residents.

**Family Center of Washington County** – \$300, \$300 (requested \$500, recommend \$400)

The Family Center provides services including child care referral, child care provider training, child care subsidy administration, infant/toddler care, preschool and after school programs, playgroups for children birth-six and their parents or caregivers, home visit programs, and parent education. It serves Washington County and three towns in Orange County. It served 113 Plainfield residents.

Friends of the Winooski River – \$0 (requested \$300, recommend \$50) The Friends is a mostly volunteer organization that is dedicated to the protection and restoration of the Winooski River watershed. They undertake a range of activities that include riparian restoration and stream-bank stabilization, pollution abatement projects, water quality monitoring and stream assessment projects and education and outreach.

Good Beginnings – \$300, \$300 (requested \$300, recommend \$200)

Good Beginnings, since 1991 volunteer mothers of all ages have been offering ongoing support, education and advocacy through free home visits to all birth and adoptive families in Central Vermont during the critical first weeks and months following birth. It serves 18 towns including Stowe,

Marshfield, Plainfield, Roxbury, Waterbury, Northfield, Barre, Montpelier and surrounding towns. It served 12 Plainfield residents.

**Green Mountain Transit Agency** – \$786, \$786 (requested \$786, recommend level funding \$786)

GMTA provides transportation for elderly citizens and individuals with disabilities. Additional transportation services are offered for all those who are transit dependent. It serves all of Washington County as well as the towns of Stowe, Morrisville, Washington, Williamstown, and Orange with seasonal service to communities in Mad River Valley. It provided Medicaid, Elderly and Disabled social service transportation service to 35 Plainfield residents.

**People's Health and Wellness Clinic** – \$750, \$750 (requested \$750, recommend level funding \$750)

This organization provides health care for the uninsured and underinsured. Its basic service area is Washington County, plus the towns of Orange, Washington, and Williamstown. It served 11 unduplicated Plainfield residents.

**Retired Senior Volunteer Program (RSVP)** – \$150, \$150 (requested \$400, recommend level funding \$150)

RSVP recruits, matches and places volunteers in non-profit and public organizations to help meet and solve community problems. It serves the counties of Washington, Lamoille, Essex, Orleans, Caledonia and parts of Orange. It had three volunteers from Plainfield who provided 445 hours of service to Community of Vermont Elders, Washington County Family Court and the Holiday Project.

**Sexual Assault Crisis Team** – \$.00, \$200(requested \$200, recommend level funding \$200)

SACT offers advocacy and services for male and female survivors of sexual violence. These services include emotional support, peer support, criminal justice advocacy, hospital advocacy, social services advocacy, safety planning and emergency shelter. Sighting confidentiality, they did not provide a number of people served from Plainfield.

**TLC** - \$375, \$.00 (requested \$500, recommend \$400)

TLC provides safe, educational, healthy, and nurturing after school activities for the students of Cabot and Twinfield Union School. They offer several types of activities for students in K-12 grade. They also involve high school students as assistant activity leaders. They worked with approximately 100 Plainfield students.

**The Onion River Food Shelf** – \$700, \$700 (requested \$700, recommend level funding \$700)

This organization provides once a month (unless emergency) food for each family member 3 times a day for at least 3 days. It served 207 residents of Plainfield with food, used clothing, informational resources and application

assistance in 08, no breakdown for Plainfield residents included. Total served in 09 was 708.

**Twinfield Together Mentoring Program** – \$250, \$250, (requested \$250, recommend level funding \$250)

This is a traditional community based mentoring program. They serve only children who are residents of Plainfield and Marshfield primarily in the 4th through 9th grade. It served 8 residents.

**Twin Valley Senior Center** – \$500, \$700 (requested \$1000, recommend \$1000)

Designed for seniors, this program provides hot nutritional meals three times a week, exercise programs, monthly shopping trips, foot clinics, flu clinics, delivery of meals to home bound elderly and disabled. Approximately 33 Plainfield residents served.

The Senior Center is serving a lot of our town's residents and is going to see a rise in their rent, as well as rising food and transportation costs.

**Vermont Association for the Blind** – \$300, \$300 (requested \$750, recommend funding \$200)

This is a statewide association that offers free training, services and support to visually impaired Vermonters assisting them in achieving and maintaining independence. It served 2 Plainfield residents.

**Washington County Diversion Program** – \$150, \$150 (requested \$300, recommend level funding \$150)

This organization provides community based alternatives to the court system for first time offenders. Their clients include 29 residents of Plainfield who received drug/alcohol assessments, performed community service, paid restitution to victims, etc.

**Washington County Youth Service Bureau** – \$300, \$100 (requested \$500, recommend \$300)

This organization's mission is to empower and enrich the lives of youth and families in Washington County through a variety of programs, such as runaway youth program, teen center and Thanksgiving Dinner. They provided services to 28 Plainfield residents.

### CUTLER MEMORIAL LIBRARY

2010 was a transformative year at the Cutler Memorial Library in many ways. We're now open 5 days a week, with a new schedule (developed after feedback from patrons) that include a weekday morning, one late night a week and more weekend hours. We've made sure that there is something for every age, interest and taste, whether in the form of movies, audio materials, books, magazines or area newspapers and newsletters. We've got something we think you'll enjoy checking out and taking home for a few weeks, but there are so many more reasons to stop in regularly; they go by names like 'neighbor' and 'fellow citizen' and 'community member.' It takes more than money to invest in one's community: sustainability is not just about fuel and food, and libraries are not just about books and movies, so please "Borrow Locally!"

**Grateful Acknowledgments:** First, to the patrons who use our community's library: each time an item circulates, it is honoring the many folks who have put their heart and soul into making the Cutler Memorial a place worth visiting. Second, to all of the people who've brought the Library to its current state, especially all of the previous librarians and the current and past boards of trustees, as well as the Friends of the Cutler Memorial Library, the Master Gardeners, community presenters and workshop providers, entertainers, book donors, financial contributors and of course, our indispensable volunteers. Several trustees and members of the Friends of the Library attended trainings and/or networking opportunities this year. to optimize their ability to serve the community. Much gratitude goes to Greg Warner of PictMedia.com for implementing our first-ever web site this year. Michael Birnbaum & Karen Seeger, Janet Nielsen, David Palmer and the Libri Foundation were among our generous benefactors this year (as will be described below), and there are many others who give and have given generously of their time and energy—too many to list here, but Emlyn Crocker, Ethan Warshaw, Yana Walder and Gail Falk deserve special mention. I ask you all to thank your friends and neighbors who contribute. We are grateful to the citizens of Plainfield whose financial support has provided the appropriation that has long kept our community institution afloat. We ask for your support again, at level funding in 2011.

If you should be interested, we have an entire set of town reports for reference and research purposes. Were you to look back over the Library Reports submitted annually, you'd see that, from the day Arthur Cutler decided to move and convert his horse barn into a building for the community's use, the Cutler Memorial Library has always been a labor of love. Essentials have been provided for (through good times and bad) by pooling taxpayer support, rent from the apartment, money raised from benefit sales put on by the Friends' group, and donations from generous individuals & foundations. This year, we received a generous gift of children's books worth more than \$1400 from the Libri Foundation (with matching-grant gifts from the Friends of the Library and the Nelson Family of Iowa City, Iowa) and \$350 worth of math and science books from Hal Berenson and Laura Ackerman. As this report goes to press, the library has just received

notice that it received a \$3260 Vermont Cultural Facilities grant to cover half the costs of replacing our furnace. Also this year, in addition to being our most dedicated volunteer, Janet Nielsen sponsored the purchase of many of the new books and the new book shelf we proudly display them on. Cabinetmaker David Palmer donated his services in the fabrication of a lovely cabinet and countertop, and the Friends of the Cutler Memorial Library provided the funds to acquire our new "Library" (international symbol) flag and many new DVD movies this year. Many people have also given us books for our collection or for our fundraiser book sale planned for spring (for which helpers are sought). And thank you to Cate Farm, Local Potion, Maple Valley Store, Plainfield Co-Op, Plainfield Hardware, Tim's Convenience Store, Joyce Fowler, Maria McKnight, Helen MacDonald and Vermont Salumi for their contributions to the Friends of the Library Holiday Bazaar gift basket fundraiser, and to the raffle ticket sellers & buyers! Congratulations to the winners.

Many of you will recall that in recent years the trustees have been overseeing significant necessary upgrades on the building, inside and out, so it can continue serving our town for generations to come. In roughly the past year and a half, the Library introduced an on-line catalog and a computerized circulation system, a web site and two (newer) public computer terminals. Every area of the collection has undergone a recent refreshing, with more than one-quarter of the material replaced throughout, and new volunteers are stepping up to help. A new Book Group has formed, initiated by patrons, which meets the first Thursday evening of each month from 6:30 to 8:00.

The Library continues to provide meeting space to community groups and for events, and we've added new displays such as our 'New Books,' 'New-to-us Books,' and 'New-to-us Movies' shelves, which are frequently updated. The fiction room is now broken into genres for easy browsing (and for balance): Vintage/Classics, Romance/Western/Historic Fiction, Science Fiction/Fantasy, Contemporary Fiction, and Mystery/Suspense/Thriller. We continue to offer local and not-so-local-themed events for adults, children and families, as well as featuring talented community members who provide workshops, presentations, author readings and regular poetry events. Let us know what you'd like to see offered in 2011! We are re-introducing magazines and are receiving a year's gift subscription to Time Magazine and to the Times Argus newspaper (both in-print and on-line). Patrons can access an entire on-line library of downloadable audio books and e-books thru "Listen Up, Vermont!" from their home internet connection or from one of our computers (ask the librarian, or go to the Resources page of our web site: www.cutlerlibrary.org). And 'stay tuned' as fiber-optic internet speeds previously unavailable anywhere in Vermont come to Plainfield's library via the Vermont FiberConnect grant project through the Dept. of Libraries and the Vermont Telecommunications Authority (ours is one of only 54 communities targeted to benefit). Interested in learning more? Contact the library!

### WATER REPORT 2010

The Water System for the Town of Plainfield has produced twenty million gallons of water through November of 2010. The water is constantly checked for contaminants and continues to meet and exceed all quality water standards.

Through the year we have made necessary repairs to water leaks that developed in some of the town's water mains. Due to the age of the infrastructure, studies have been done. Several main lines are targeted for replacement. The water main scheduled to be replaced in 2010, will now need to be replaced in 2011 due to lack of funding from the State of Vermont. Other water main line upgrades will be undertaken in the future as need and the budget allow.

The water mains have been flushed in several locations. The water mains flushed clear in a timely fashion, which is a good indication of the system's general overall condition.

One of the Fowler Springs has been rehabilitated to allow us to put it back on line after it has passed the requisite tests.

Greg Chamberlin has successfully completed the required tests and apprenticeship and is certified to operate the water and wastewater facilities.

Each year you receive a Consumer Confidence Report that shows you test results of the water for the past five years. If you have questions concerning the information in the Report please contact us. We will answer your questions or pursue a resource to answer any concerns you may have.

Once again, the commissioners would like to thank Jay and Greg for an excellent job keeping our drinking water safe, and the water treatment plant in good operating condition. We continue to strive to keep our water/sewer rates low, however because of our aging water lines, it has been necessary to adjust our rates to accommodate for water line repair and replacement.

### DOG LICENSE

### Required by Vermont State Law

All dogs or wolf-hybrids six months of age or over shall be licensed annually on or before April 1st of each year. Also any dog acquired after April 1st or becoming six months old during the year shall within 30 days be licensed. Before obtaining a license for a dog or wolf-hybrid six months of age or older, a person shall deliver to the municipal clerk a certificate or a certified copy thereof issued by a duly licensed veterinarian, stating that the dog or wolf-hybrid has received a current preexposure rabies vaccination with a vaccine approved by the Agency of Agriculture Secretary, and the person shall certify that the dog or wolf-hybrid described in the certificate or copy is the dog or wolf-hybrid to be licensed.

To be licensed, all dogs and wolf-hybrids over three months of age shall be vaccinated against rabies. The initial vaccination shall be valid for 12 months. Within 9 to 12 months of the initial vaccination, the animal must receive a booster vaccination. All subsequent vaccinations following the initial vaccination shall be valid for 36 months.

A 50% penalty is charged for dogs owned and not licensed by April 1st each year.

### PLAINFIELD CONSERVATION COMMISSION REPORT FOR 2010

We meet at 7:15 p.m. on the third Wednesday of each month, in the meeting room at the town offices. All townspeople are welcome. Anyone interested in helping with one or more of our projects, or serving on the commission or being involved in any way is encouraged to contact any of the commissioners listed below, or the Selectboard. *Our major goal is to foster community involvement and responsibility for our town's natural resources, in accordance with the town plan.* Our work is accomplished with the invaluable help of many different partners from the community and beyond, to whom we are very grateful. Without them, very few of our projects would be possible. Here are some of the things we've been working on this year:

We continue our efforts to make the Town Forest an excellent resource for the people of Plainfield. In May, we had the great opportunity to work with the Vermont Youth Conservation Corp, who helped us remove trash and invasive plants, clean out a small spring, and construct a puncheon boardwalk to provide access through a boggy section near one of the two parking areas. We marked routes for other possible trails as well. In October we hosted another "get acquainted" walk around the forest, which we do periodically. Using information shared with us during walks with Russ Barrett (County Forester) and Matt Leonard (Forester, Department of Forests, Parks and Recreation) and from many other sources, we've drafted a comprehensive management plan for our Town Forest, and after public review and comments, the Selectboard will vote on its adoption. After the plan is approved, we will continue to work on trails, signage and maintaining a healthy forest.

Aggressive, non-native plants are a concern in Plainfield as elsewhere. Members of the conservation commission are more than happy to help Plainfield residents identify invasive species on your property, and can make suggestions to help control their spread.

Members of the conservation commission and other volunteers continue to coordinate the Green Up Day efforts of the many who make this event a success in Plainfield. Last year we collected a lot of roadside and riverbank trash, and helped spruce up the Recreation Field and village park, too. Thank you, volunteers! Green Up day is always the first Saturday in May (this year it will be May 7), and we always meet at the Rec Field 9-11 a.m. for refreshments, route assignments and trash bags. Hope to see you there. For more information, or to "claim" a route ahead of time, call Becky Buchanan (479-4326) or Sarah O'Brien (479-5535).

We continue to maintain the pet waste bag dispenser at the village park. Unfortunately, the dispenser we installed at the Rec Field was destroyed by vandalism. We hope pet owners use the bags to keep the areas where we walk and play cleaner and safer, and keep Great Brook and the Winooski River cleaner, too.

Our Street Trees program (which helps calm the flow of traffic and beautifies our town), maintenance of the village park, the new trees planted by the conservation commission along Route 2, and other projects that help make Plainfield a nice place to live are made possible with the help of our annual fundraising Tree and Shrub sale and matching grants from the State's Department of Forests, Parks and Recreation. Held every spring for many years now, we recently began sharing the work and profits with the Marshfield Conservation Commission. This year we each took home a little over \$800.

Commissioners and other volunteers worked hard to take care of the demonstration Rain Garden installed in our park. This project not only provides education for the public, it helps control erosion and pollution of the Winooski River from storm runoff.

Additional partnerships: We continued our work with the Friends of the Winooski and the Town of Plainfield to improve fish habitat in Great Brook through improvements at three culverts on the brook. The new culverts and downstream rock weirs increase ease of fish passage. We worked with the Plainfield Area Community Association on several projects this year, including cleaning and landscaping the Park and Ride area, and installing the new bus shelter. Two commissioners received training in mapping vernal pools and collection of information for the vernal pools database. This training was partially funded by the Vermont State Wildlife Grants Program.

We want to remind you that the Conservation Fund, administered by the Selectboard, exists to assist landowners in their conservation efforts. Information and applications are available at the town clerk's office.

The commissioners extend our continued gratitude to Larry Holt for keeping the Route 2 rest area mowed and cared for. His efforts create an attractive welcome to those who travel the road to Plainfield. Thank you, Larry! And thanks to all our organizational partners, among which are the Friends of the Winooski, the Vermont Youth Conservation Corps, Efficiency Vermont, Green Up Vermont, the Upper Winooski Planning Council, and others. And to all the villagers who took on watering and caring for the new trees, or helped make our village attractive by planting, maintaining and weeding public spaces in the village – a very big THANK YOU!

Maintenance of the local 911 data bases is being done completely in Montpelier now. Previously, some of this was done through Verizon. All the maps, phone numbers and coordination are now done by the Vermont E-911 office. This has made it easier to maintain the local information and make any needed changes. Changes or corrections are plugged into the system immediately.

Dispatch for our area is still through the dispatch center in Williston.

Remember that dialing 911 is for emergencies only. If you need to contact the police, fire or ambulance for any other reason, please use the phone numbers listed below.

As usual, if you have experienced any problems using the 911 system, please let me know.

### PLAINFIELD FIRE AND RESCUE

The Plainfield Fire and Rescue has completed another year with an average call volume of approximately 200 calls. These calls consisted mostly of emergency medical and motor vehicle accidents. Fire related calls were minimal during the summer months; however these types of calls picked up during the winter months as would be expected.

The Fire Department completed the weatherization project this year and is very excited on the accomplishments of this total project. The weatherization project consisted of cellulose in the attic, dense pack cellulose in the long walls, spray foam and upgrades in all lighting. This project was helped along with a weatherization grant and funds set aside in a construction fund. This project should help to save a large amount of heating oil and may reduce the cost of heating the fire house by half. The project could also not have been completed without the significant amount of volunteer labor by the fire department personnel.

As in past years, the fire department has level funded and reduced all aspects of our budget lines in our control. The members of the fire department believe strongly in fiscal responsibility and have had much support in our fund raising events which continue to allow purchasing outside of the tax base support.

The Plainfield Fire and Rescue would like to remind everyone to please check your smoke detectors, have your chimney cleaned and inspected and make sure your residence is marked clearly for identification of house number.

Thanks to all dedicated members of our great service. Without these volunteers our community would suffer greatly. Anyone interested in joining our dedicated team should contact Chief Martin 839-6302 or any member of the fire department.

### PLAINFIELD FAST SQUAD REPORT 2010

2010 saw a major change in emergency care for the town of Plainfield. Starting on July 1st, we switched our ambulance service to East Montpelier Fire and Rescue. EMFD just completed building a new fire station, including space for their two ambulances, three miles from the village of Plainfield. Plainfield Fire and Rescue and the Plainfield Selectboard felt it was in the best interest of the town to change our ambulance coverage to EMFD considering their proximity to the town and their longstanding commitment to excellent patient care. As you may have read in the newspaper, Barre Town Ambulance negotiated a contract this spring with the town of Berlin that gave Berlin a lower per capita rate, and as a result of this contract many of the smaller towns that BTEMS served would have paid a higher per capita rate (Plainfield included). East Montpelier Fire and Rescue offered Plainfield a three-year contract for ambulance coverage at a better rate, which the Town of Plainfield opted to accept. It has been our experience to-date that EMFD's ambulance response time and patient care has been top notch. We would like to thank Barre Town Ambulance for many years of excellent service to the town; we have the utmost respect for them.

Last year the Plainfield Fast Squad responded to 120 emergency calls in the towns of Plainfield and Marshfield. The minimum amount of time required for each of these calls is 30 minutes and can last an hour or more at times, this can be quite demanding on personnel and our families. The Fast Squad also holds regular monthly meetings that are two to three hours long. Participation on our department is a huge commitment by each individual on the service. I would to thank our members who go above and beyond of what's expected of them on a daily basis, to make our communities a better and safer place to live and work. Thank you Amy Holt, Monica Light, Johnathan Matthew, Sarah Matthew, and Hazel May. We are currently licensed with the State as an Intermediate level responder service. We are currently looking for a few more team-oriented individuals to join our service. If you think you have what it takes to be a proud member of the Plainfield Fire and Rescue department, please call me for more information.

### WASHINGTON COUNTY SHERIFF 2010

The Town of Plainfield has contracted with the Washington County Sheriff's Department for many years. The Sheriff's Department is glad to be able to assist with public safety within your community. Although the Department's main functions in statute are to transport prisoners, mental health patients and juveniles who are in custody of the State of Vermont and serve civil process, we take great pride in being able to be a part of keeping the citizens and visitors within the County safe.

In the spring of 2010 the Sheriff's Department was once again honored by Vermont's Governor Highway Safety Program. Our Department placed 1st in the Sheriff's division of the Vermont Law Enforcement Challenge for our efforts in keeping the roadways safe within Washington County in 2009. In the past five years the Washington County Sheriffs Department has consistently placed in the top 5, having three 1st, one 2nd and one 3rd place finishes.

We continue to work to enhance safety within the County from searching out wanted persons, to patrols and motor vehicle check points, snowmobile patrols, offering hunter safety classes, assisting with snowmobile safety classes, providing presentations of the rollover convincer (a seat belt use demonstrator) and speaking to youths in regards to highway safety and preventing underage drinking. We once again handed out over 2000 candy canes on Christmas Eve, reminding drivers to have a safe and happy holiday season.

County wide, our patrol efforts during fiscal year 2010 generated 323 incidents and 1771 Vermont Traffic Citations. The Department arrested 35 persons for DUI, 31 persons for driving with a criminally suspended license and arrested 15 persons on arrest warrants.

During fiscal year 2010 we patrolled 202 hours funded by the Town of Plainfield. In the course of our patrols many vehicles are stopped and at times warnings are given. The Sheriff's Department augments town funded patrols with patrols funded by grants. The Washington County Sheriffs Department receives two grants each year- one for Highway safety/aggressive driving and one for DUI enforcement. Grant funded patrols have put extra patrols in Plainfield, at no cost to Plainfield.

We are proud of the work we do and take pride in our efforts in making Washington County a safe place to live and work.

### PLAINFIELD HISTORICAL SOCIETY ANNUAL REPORT

In 2010, the Plainfield Historical Society continued to advance its mission, which is "to collect, preserve, share and create materials that establish or illustrate the history of Plainfield, Vermont".

The Historical Society sold softcover copies of its 140-page *Pictorial History of the Town of Plainfield (1870–1940)* at town meeting, at Old Home Day, and on-line through our website www.plainfieldvthistory.org. The book continues to be available for sale at the Country Bookshop, the office of the Plainfield Town Clerk, and the Vermont History Museum in Montpelier. We had a limited number of hard-bound copies of the Pictorial History book printed, they will be available through our sales coordinator Bev Thomas.

Historical Society member Dave Ferland has continued to manage our website, where visitors can read a short history of Plainfield and find out about the Historical Society, its activities and publications. In the coming year we hope to add the minutes from our monthly meetings.

The Historical Society prepared a display for the Vermont History Expo this year with the help of Justin Byerly. The 2010 exhibit featured "Bread and Puppet Theater: The Plainfield Years 1970-1974." From September through January, the PHS presented an exhibit at the Plainfield Community Center of photographs from past calendars.

In September, we produced our sixth annual wall calendar as a fundraiser, using the theme of "Plainfield at Play". This calendar is now available at the Plainfield Town Clerk's office, Red Store, Tim's, the Food Co-Op, Country Bookstore, The Blinking Light Gallery, the Cutler Memorial Library, Tasca Restaurant, and Plainfield Hardware. We wish to thank our advertisers and patrons for their support for the calendar project these past six years.

Our annual membership meeting in December featured a presentation by Russell "Tink" Goslant, Mel and Mary Etta Chase, and Betty and Dennis Dix. An audio copy of the presentation will be available at the Cutler library this spring.

The Society began the year with a balance of \$5188.75. In the course of the year it had revenues of \$4406.00 (calendar advertisement, supporters, and the sale of books and calendars), and expenditures of \$3656.30, leaving a current balance of \$5938.45.

The Society is a volunteer, not for profit association who make the decisions and carry out the work of the organization. Artifacts and printed materials donated to the Plainfield Historical Society over the years are housed in a small building on School Street owned by the Town of Plainfield, which once served as the village's first firehouse. # REPORT FROM THE PLAINFIELD ENERGY COORDINATOR 2010

Greetings to the citizens of Plainfield and best wishes for health, heat, and comfort for the rest of 2011, and into 2012! We are all partners in the solution of a great problem, and that is how to reverse the slow death of our Planet Earth. We each have a responsibility to put our best efforts forward and make conservation and best use of renewable energy sources part of our daily lives. Put simply, we have to do better, for the sake of our own health and the future survival of our children. How do we do this? It can be the simplest of small steps, which when added up make a huge difference, not only in the money your household will save on energy costs, but the gift of healthy living you can give to yourself, your children, and your Planet.

# Here are some simple, effective, steps YOU and your family can take today!

- Turn down the thermostat, or better yet, replace it with a programmable one which suits your lifestyle...saving up to 8% a year of your heating bill.
- Have your furnace or boiler tuned up annually. Keep flues and filters clean. Seal and insulate ductwork. Keep heat vents and radiators clean and cleared for best heat circulation.
- Keep the heat in and the cold out. Button Up your house by sealing leaks and adding weather-stripping and insulation where necessary. FREE DVD's are available upon request.
- Save on water heating by turning down the temperature to a comfortable minimum, insulating the hot and cold pipes at the water heater, installing low-flow devices on faucets and showers, repairing leaking faucets and water lines, and washing clothes in cold water.
- Save electricity by replacing light bulbs and fixtures with compact fluorescents, turning off lights, computers, and appliances when not in use, and reduce "phantom" loads by putting electronics on power strips and switching them all off at once. Shop for and purchase Energy Star appliances – you will be amazed at the savings, for example, a new Energy Star washer uses only \$11 of electricity per year!
- Invest in a comprehensive energy audit for your household or business. The typical cost is \$300-400; however, \$150 rebate coupons are available from me or Efficiency VT. You will be amazed at the potential for heating dollars and carbon to be saved. Put the recommendations into play, and receive a tax credit for certain items. Rebates, incentives, can be found at www.dsireusa.org
- Save gasoline or diesel by keeping your vehicle tuned up, tires inflated, slowing down and driving steadily, avoiding lengthy idling (idling your

vehicle for two minutes uses enough fuel to drive the vehicle one mile!), combining and minimizing your trips, and carpooling. Parking your car and using public transit, (particularly the new US2 Commuter!), biking, or walking are other ways to conserve fuel.

Some of the projects which the Plainfield Energy Group, sometimes in cooperation with the Marshfield Energy and Climate Change Committee (MECCC), and others have completed in 2010-2011 are:

- Continuing support of the Green Mountain Transit Agency's (GMTA) Climate Mitigation and Air Quality (CMAQ) grant, which funded a commuter bus for the US-2 corridor from St. Johnsbury to Montpelier. Thanks to the Select Board having the foresight to place the article on the Town Meeting agenda, and the overwhelming support of the voters to subsidize the demonstration project for 3 years, the bus was able to start operation at the end of April 2010. The expected yearend ridership of 36 passengers per day was met at the end of the first month. Ridership continues to grow at an amazing rate, and at the end of September, 2010, was at over 42 riders per day. With rising gas prices and winter weather, ridership will continue to grow. If you haven't ridden the bus yet, be sure to check it out! The regular fare is just \$1.00 one-way and only \$.50 for students, seniors, and specials.
- I was fortunate enough to procure a new commuter shelter from GMTA, and with the help of Mike Nolan, approval of funding by the Select Board, and the help of many volunteers, a pad was poured, the shelter erected, and plantings placed by the Conservation Commission and PACA. Be sure to stop by the Park and Ride lot on Main St. Ext. and admire it! A bike rack will be added in the future.
- Participated as a grantee in the Central Vermont Regional Planning Commission's and received two FREE commercial energy audits on town buildings. The Town Hall on High St. and the Wastewater plant on Recreation Field Rd. were the selected sites. The audit results are back, and there are many opportunities for saving energy and dollars, particularly at the Town Hall.
- Taking advantage of the Efficiency VT program to replace T-12 fluorescent fixtures in all town buildings. As T-12 tubes will not be sold after 2012, this is the time to act on this. The replacement or converted T-8 or T-5 fixtures use less than a third of the electricity of the old t-12's and provide improved lighting.
- Efficiency Vermont, in partnership with Green Mountain Power and
  participating towns is offering substantial rebates and incentives
  for the conversion of municipal street and building lighting to LED
  technology. Early sign-up also qualifies the town for 12 hours of
  free engineering consulting service. An inventory of existing street

- lighting fixtures has been completed and we are preparing an estimate for replacing and redistributing the lighting.
- Ed Hutchinson, Bob Atchinson, and Rich Phillips attended a Photo Voltaic (PV) Installer's Training, sponsored by Green Mountain Power and Renewable Energy Vermont. If you are considering a PV installation, please contact one of us for more information and planning assistance.

## Some of the projects Plainfield Energy hopes to work on this year are:

- Applying for grants and/or seeking American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA) funding for more weatherization projects in the town, including the recently audited town-owned public buildings (particularly our Town Hall), and also private and commercial buildings.
- Continuing our close relationship with the Marshfield Energy Committee and partnering on projects such as weatherization and possible photovoltaic installation for Twinfield Union School.
- Recruiting more volunteers to continue our work, seeking status in the town as a full-fledged Energy Committee, and creating a web page on the town website to let others know about our work.
- Loaning Kill-o-Watt meters to townspeople to identify the largest electric consuming appliances in their household or business. These meters were acquired through a New England Grassroots Organization grant and can be borrowed through Ed Hutchinson at 454-1131.
- Continuing to function as a clearing house for information about weatherization and alternative energy, and providing opinions and advice to the town's administration related to energy issues.

### CVSWMD FY 2010 REPORT

The Central Vermont Solid Waste Management District's mission is to provide leadership, education, and services for residents and businesses in reducing and managing their solid waste in order to protect public health and the environment to the greatest extent feasible. To meet this goal, the District Board of Supervisors developed and adopted a Zero Waste Solid Waste Implementation Plan (SWIP) titled *Working toward Zero Waste*. The goal of a Zero Waste approach to waste management is to cease producing "trash" that is disposed of and to utilize materials as resources for the production of something new and needed.

The CVSWMD is a union municipality consisting of 18 member cities and towns and the approximately 52,000 residents that live within them. The District's four full-time, two part-time office staff, and two full-time field staff implement the organizational programming and events to assist these 18 communities in complying with the solid waste management requirements of the State of Vermont.

FY10 was a challenging year for the CVSWMD. The six member towns of Bradford, Barre Town, Cabot, Calais, Northfield, and Hardwick saw this clearly when CVSWMD operated recycling depots transitioned to either the towns or private companies. While this move was certainly difficult for those towns, as well as CVSWMD staff, the District simply could not afford to continue to operate the depots. We are pleased to report that five of the six depots that the District previously ran are still in operation; with private haulers, accepting the same items and open on the same schedule. A private bag-drop business has set up near the site of the one depot that closed, in the Town of Hardwick, maintaining services in that community as well.

The District continues to work to provide programming to meet the needs of our member towns and residents. In FY10, the District reinstated Green Up Day Grants to help member towns cover the costs of town cleanups, and began to offer additional collection opportunities. CVSWMD programs included the following:

• **Organics Diversion Programs**—With food scraps comprising about 20% of the waste Vermonters produce every year, this waste stream is a critical one to tackle. In response, the District has developed a three-pronged approach to reaching the key sources of this waste: businesses/institutions, schools, and residents.

During FY10, the CVSWMD increased participation in the Business/ Institution Organics Diversion program from 49 to 70. Participating businesses and institutions diverted an estimated 858 tons (more than 1.7 million pounds!) of food scraps to composting in FY10. Two Plainfield businesses are currently participating.

The 24 K-12 schools in the School Organics Program diverted an estimated 102.5 tons (205,000 pounds!) of food scraps. At the close of the 2009-2010 school year, 73% of public school students in District

member towns were diverting food scraps to composting through the CVSWMD program. Twinfield Union School joined the program in May 2007 and has diverted an estimated 9.74 tons since the start, 4.62 tons (9,250 lbs.) in FY10 alone.

The District's Residential Organics Program helps residents manage their food scraps at home. In FY10, the District offered its composting booklet and free plans for building several types of compost bins on its Web site. In addition, the District sold Green Cones at a reduced cost to increase access to this useful backyard food digester that accepts meat, dairy, and other food scraps not typically put into compost bins. Participants in past CVSWMD Green Cone programs were surveyed this spring, and all respondents agreed, "the cones are an effective way to reduce trash in VT." For more information, see www.cvswmd. org/wp/home-composting-green-cones/

- **Recycling**—On February 6, 2010, the CVSWMD transitioned operations of the six depots it operated to towns and private haulers. Five of those depots remain in operation; a private hauler opened a bag-drop for recycling and trash near the site of the one depot that did close, maintaining service in that community.
- Special Collections—The District ran a variety of special materials
  collection events in FY10. Additional programming as well as more
  electronics, books, and textile collections will be underway in FY11.

Hazardous Waste—683 households and 12 businesses utilized the five collections held during FY10. Collections are held from spring through fall each year, and educational materials are distributed at the events to help residents understand how to reduce the quantity of hazardous materials they use and the amount of waste produced. A total of 81,401 lbs. of mixed hazardous waste was collected in FY10, including paints, acids, bases, mercury, thinners, etc. The safe disposal of these materials cost the CVSWMD \$88,230.

*Electronics Collections*—The District collected 50.56 tons of electronics (computers, TVs, stereos, printers, copiers, fax machines, cell phones, etc.) for recycling in FY10 through the Barre Town Recycling Depot and special collections held in Tunbridge, Hardwick, Montpelier, and Bradford.

Cell Phone and Battery Boxes in Member Towns—The District started to get this new (and free!) recycling opportunity underway in FY10. All member towns have been invited to participate in these collections and collection boxes are already in place in 12 towns. Plainfield is taking part and the collection box is located in the town office.

- **Green Up Day Grants** This service to our member communities had been suspended during FY09 but was reinstated for Green Up Day 2010. Towns were offered the opportunity to request up to \$500 in FY10. A total of \$5,122 was distributed to the 11 member towns that requested grants.
- CVSWMD E-News—The District publishes a monthly e-newsletter and regularly sends e-mail notices about special events to town clerk offices, select board chairs, legislators, and more. All residents from member towns are welcome to receive the e-communications. You can sign up at the CVSWMD Web site www.cvswmd.org
- **Web Site**—The District continued to revise and update its Web site in FY 2010, including ongoing updates of the popular *A-Z Guide to Waste Reduction and Resource Handling* database and the Reuse Business Database. See www.cvswmd.org.
